COURSE DESCRIPTION

Some of the general purposes of Sophomore Speech Communication are to provide a comprehensive treatment of all major topics in speech communication, including interpreting verbal and nonverbal messages, listening techniques, giving speeches, and using feedback. Students will relate theory to practice by applying communication skills to everyday life. Areas of study include the communication process, interpersonal communication, small group communication, public speaking, and persuasive speaking. This course will build and strengthen communication skills.

Time is spent on research skills, audience analysis, and adaptation and oral delivery of messages.

Students receive performance grades, test grades, and grades for various written assignments. Some assignments are done on an individual basis; others are in co-operation with another student or group.

Speech Communication is required for honors and standard levels for graduation.
